Collecting these documents at admission will serve as the baseline status to confirm a decline throughout the patient's time on hospice, assisting with justification of eligibility. Part 1 criteria documents the decline in clinical status guidelines focusing on the decline in clinical status guidelines: Recurrent infections, Weight loss,

Local Coverage Determination: Documenting Clinical Decline ...

Hospice benefit periods are unlimited as long as the above remains true and documentation of disease progression is evident. Generally, a beneficiary will show decline from one certification period to the next; however, this may not be the case for some beneficiaries whose condition may not run the normal course of decline and remain temporarily unchanged.

Hospice Documentation - CGS Medicare

Decline is inherent to the dying process in most diseases and most hospice staff are attuned to documenting the slightest signs. But decline is also associated with chronic conditions and advanced age. In denial statements, reviewers often state there is evidence of decline, but deny the claim because terminal status is not established.

Documentation to Support Patient Decline 1 Importance of ...

In hospice, we need to document achievement of goals while also documenting the progress of a patient's disease which in most cases is declining. When patients are having good days, I think it is sometimes natural to focus on that in documentation and not always accurately document the physical things that are still going on."

Hospice Eligibility Documentation Tips and Strategies 2

Hospice documentation is consistent when it supports the plan of care, the orders, observations that you or other members of the care team have made. All details should match each other and problems, goals, and interventions should correspond accordingly.

Hospice Documentation: Cloning and Checkboxes Just Won't ...

Nurses are typically more comfortable documenting this as it is easier and more tangible to assess. The Hospice Nurse needs to document a baseline ADL at the time of admission and then with each nursing visit. Point out any changes in ability of the patient to manage ADL's. This is also a very good indicator of decline.

Hospice Poor Documentation to Support Terminal Prognosis Documentation reviewed for 10/1/2015-10/31/2015 shows: Hospice admission weight was 82.5 lbs. (hospital weight 85 lbs.) Has poor appetite Appears thin, clothes are loose fitting Totally dependent for all ADLs Incontinent of urine and feces Nonconversive

Hospice Nursing Documentation: Supporting Terminal Prognosis

Our PCM reminds us to chart to the Hospice or billable Dx. If a patient is on service for COPD or Lung Ca, make sure to include documentation showing any decline (increasing SOB, more frequent use of O2 or PRN neb Tx to manage Sx., etc) in that area. Of course it is important to chart overall decline and declines in other body systems as well.

Hospice charting (Neg- Charting) ? - Hospice / Palliative ...

Medicare rules and regulations addressing hospice services require the documentation of sufficient "clinical information and other documentation" to support the certification of individuals as having a terminal illness with a life expectancy of 6 or fewer months, if the illness runs its normal course.

3Principles of Proper IDT Documentation

REMEMBER: When documenting weight loss, increase sleeping, decrease appetite etc.... the medical record must include the objective measurable data to support these findings for it to be used to support hospice eligibility (e.g. weight loss in lbs and percentage of weight loss, # of hours of sleep in a 24 hours period).

Documenting Hospice Eligibility for Alzheimer's Dementia ...

• Have remained on the hospice benefit for a long period of time; or • Have chronic illnesses with a more general decline. Documentation to support the terminal prognosis at the time of the hospice admission may include: • Changes in condition to initiate the hospice referral

Hospice Denial Fact Sheet - Denial Reason 5PTER: Six-month ...

The amount and detail of documentation will differ in different situations. Thus a patient with metastatic small cell CA may be demonstrated to be hospice eligible with less documentation than a chronic lung disease patient. Patients with chronic diseases, long term survival in hospice, or apparent stability can still be eligible for

Determining & Documenting Terminal Prognosis for Hospice ...

Although a decline in function is an anticipated outcome for patients in hospice care many patients have lost most or all of their capacity for meaningful interaction before they enroll. Moreover, expectations of decline that are built into hospice eligibility requirements may not adequately reflect the trajectories of hospice patients.

•Document the context and the events that led to the in-patient level of care. •Document the failed attempts to control/manage symptoms prior to in-patient level of care admission. •Document care that caregivers cannot manage at home (frequent changes in medication/medication titration etc.).
