Home Health Aide salary. As per the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 2015 the average hourly wage of a HHA was \$11.00 and the average annual wage was \$22,870. Approximately 820,630 individuals were employed as HHAs in 2015 and the top 10% of the employees earned \$29,950 / year. Moreover, the average hourly home health aide salary differed slightly depending upon the establishment of work:

Unfortunately, Medicare does not cover custodial care, or long-term care, often required for those diagnosed with Alzheimer's, cancer, and many other conditions. Home Health Aide Hourly Pay | PayScale

A home health aide is a person working for a home health agency or hospice that performs home health services ordered by a licensed physician, licensed chiropractor, licensed podiatrist, or licensed optometrist. The home health aide must successfully complete a home health agency's competency evaluation. Home Health Agencies and Hospices are responsible for establishing their own policies on qualifications and needed training.

ISDH: Home Health Aide (HHA) Registration Program

After a physician prescribes a home health plan of care, the HHA assesses the patient's condition and likely skilled nursing care, therapy, medical social services and home health aide service needs, at the beginning of the episode of care. The assessment must be done for each subsequent episode of care a patient receives.

Home health aides are considered health care paraprofessionals and must meet state-set training requirements. (Other types of home health workers are sometimes lumped together under the title of home health aides; see the box.) They might live with the care recipient or work regular shifts.
