The meaning of the term "under the color of law" has been significantly expanded since it was introduced in 1871. It now includes a wide variety of governmental agencies from police departments to public schools. The key is to demonstrate that the agency exists because of or for a governmental or political subdivision.

That's why, immediately after the Civil War, Congress approved Title 18 USC 242 -- a statute making it a crime to deprive any person of their rights "under color of law." But, as case-by-case Justice Department records make very clear, a law on the books does not always translate into a law that is enforced.

The Meaning of 'Under Color of' Law

For the purpose of Section 242, acts under “color of law” include acts not only done by federal, state, or local officials within the their lawful authority, but also acts done beyond the bounds of that official’s lawful authority, if the acts are done while the official is purporting to or pretending to act in the performance of his/her official duties.

It is a crime for one or more persons acting under color of law willfully to deprive or conspire to deprive another person of any right protected by the Constitution or laws of the United States. “Color of law” simply means that the person doing the act is using power given to him or her by a governmental agency (local, state or federal).

Officers sued in a 1983 civil action have the same fair notice right as do defendants charged under 18 U.S. C. 242, which makes it a crime for a state official to act willfully and under color of state to deprive a person of constitutional rights. This Courts opinion in United States v.
